Adee. I. The first of this name in Rye was John, said to have beenthesonofaclergymanoftheChurchofEngland. Heismen tioned1750-1766aslivingonHog-penRidge. Hisfarm,apparently, was that now owned by his descendant John A. Merritt.. •

II. Daniel Adee,2 first mentioned 1788, probably a son of John, lived inthesamelocality. HemarriedJemimaHobby,andhadthreesons: Hobby, David, and William; and three daughters: Sarah (died young), Charlotte, and Tamazon.

III. 1. Hobby Adee, 3 mentioned 1799, son of Daniel, 2 had three sons: Daniel of New York, Samuel, lately of New York, and one who died young; and six daughters.

**Benjamin Kniffen,** perhaps the Benjamin mentioned in 1724, died aboutthecloseoftheRevolution. Hiswill,dated1783,nameshis sons, Andrew, Roger, and Benjamin; and his daughters, Gertrude Bull, Phoebe Bull, Sarah Kniffen, **Mary Wilson**, Elizabeth Sherwood, and Jemima Merritt.

WILLSON. I.Samuelwasthefirstofthefamilywhosettledinthis townorinGreenwich. HewasprobablyasonofJeremiahWillson

andMaryhiswife,ofNewShorehamorBlockIsland,whodiedin1740, a son of Sumuel of Portsmouth, Rhode Island, one of the freemen of 1655,whodiedin1682,agedsixtyyears. SamuelcamefromRhode Island in or previous to the year 1710, and settled on the place now ownedbyJohnB.HaightonKingStreet. HiswifewasSusannahOg- den.

Hediedearlyintheyear1751, and the inventory of his estate as returned by the appraisers Hay 14, 1751, amounted to £13,478 5s. IO^rf., of which £9,015 was real estate. His wife Susannah died in 1770. Children: Samuel, Joseph, William; Susannah, married Kniffen of Rye; and Mary, married Roger Lyon of North Castle. William was under twenty-one in 1751, and died in 1763, unmarried.

II. 1. **Samuel,2** son of Samuel, **married Phoebe Lyon**, and lived on the place now owned by the Misses Willson on King Street, where he diedJuly2,1756. PhoebehiswifediedJanuary29,1770. Children: Samuel, Benjamin, Justus, Jotham, Andrew, Roger, Thomas, and Susan nah,whomarriedGabrielMany,andlivedatAmsterdam,NewYork; all under twenty-one years of age at the time of the death of their father in 1756.

Lyon. The tradition in this family runs that Thomas Lyon and John Banks came together from Yorkshire, England, about the year 1640. to the spot where they settled on the east bank of By ram River, which theyreachedbyboatfromStamford. Savingthedate, which is many years too early, the legend may be correct. **Thomas Lyon** was aland holder in Stamford in 1650 and 1652. (Hist. of Stamford, pp. 57,60.) He is said to have been born December 1621. He **married Abigail**. Children:

John, Joseph, **Thomas**, Deborah, .Samuel, Sarah, Hannah, Rachel, The marriage of 'John Banks and Abigail Lyon ' is on record at Stamford,asoccurringApril3,1672. IamledtothinkthatthisAbi gail was the widow of Thomas Lyon above named. In 1719 John Banks3 and John Lyon3 style themselves nephews of Samuel Lyon.2 (N.Y.Col.MSS.,lxi.156.) Thiswouldimplythattheirfatherswere brothers-in-law, or half-brothers; the latter conjecture seems probable from the name, as Thomas had a wife but no daughter Abigail.
