Jan 24, 1734, it is surmised that this was purposely deferred till the death of the father had given full possession, and hence that he survived till the latter date. About this, however, there is no certainty.

On August 18, 1714, John Estill, of Monmouth County, N. J., sold to "John Hogland," of same place, 200 acres of land in said County of Monmouth, and a year before this, May 25, 1713, he, "Jan Hooglandt," had a daughter, Nelke, baptized at Freehold. He sold this property prior to 1719, and removed to the vicinity of New Brunswick, where four of his son Derrick's children were baptized. And, as is seen by the deed to his brother William, he was then (1721) of "Raritan, Middlesex Co." About this latter date his son Derrick bought lot 6 of the Harlingen tract, a part of which he again sold in 1731.29

Jan Dircksen (3) and his son Derrick continued together, and by 1741 we find them finally settled at Amwell, in Hunterdon County. Here probably Jan Dircksen died, but his wife, Jacoba, was living Further account will show that Hendrick, a brother of Jan Dircksen, likewise settled in New Jersey.

- 10. Derrick, born about 1690.
- 11. Willem, born about 1692.
- 12. Tytje, baptized at Brooklyn, March 29, 1695. We find no further trace of her. The witnesses of the baptism were Martin Schenck and his wife Elizabeth (daughter of Minnie Johannes), strong proof that they were related to Jacoba, mother of Tytje. (See note 26.)
- 13. Hendrick, born about 1697.
- 14. Cornelius, born about 1700.
- 15. Nelke, baptized at Freehold, N. J., May 25, 1713. she is the "Neeltie Kinne," a witness at the baptism of her nephew, Cornelius (47), in 1732.
- One Jacobus Hogelant, whose wife was Marey, had a daughter, Martha, baptized at New Brunswick, August 28, 1737. We presume this Jacobus was a son of Jan Dirckson (3), and so named after his mother, He could not be the Jacobus, or James, son of Derick (10).
- 4. WILLEM DIRCKSEN HOOGLAND, the second son of Dirck Jansen (1) and Annetie (Bergen) Hoogland, was born about 1669, and
