On April 18, 1706, we find Hoogland petitioning for payment for two of his horses, lost in Colonel Dongan's expedition to Albany in 1688, in which expedition his cousin, Johannes Hoogland, of New York, served as a trooper. Mr. Hoogland, still retaining, as we see, his ability for business, had now passed the limit of three score and ten years; but such was his tenure of life, that for at least fifteen years longer his venerable form yet moved among the living, but not the companions of his prime, for most of these had passed away.

Having now reached the age of eighty-six, he must soon have paid the debt of nature, though there is cause for believing that his life was prolonged to his ninety-eighth year.

After these few paragraphs concerning their progenitor, we now propose to trace the different families of this branch of the Hoogland family in the order of their generations.

## 1. DIRCK JANSEN HOOGLAND.

Their daughter Annetie was baptized at Esopus September 5, 1686.<sup>22</sup>

- 4. Willem, born 1669.
- 5. Cornelius, born 1677.
- 6. Hendrick, born 1679.
- 7. Sarah,28 baptized at Flatbush, August 7, 1681.
- 8. Lysbeth, baptized at Flatlands, March 21, 1684.
- Neltje, baptized at Flatlands, June 11, 1686.
