Daughter Patty Callaway one third part of my land on Johns Creek whereon she now lives; slaves **Molly, Dilce and Will**

Other bequests:

Son John B. Trent tract where I now live; slaves Jesse, Ailce and her child (a mulattoe named Fanny) and James; also a feather bed and furniture.

Daughter Eady Mitchell one third part of my land on Johns Creek whereon she now lives; slaves **Hannah**, **Edmund and Selah**; a feather bed and furniture which she has; also my riding beast.

Daughter Sally Goodwin one third part of my land on Johns Creek being the land next to James River; slaves **Murning, Solomon and Sulph**.

Granddaughter Nancy Giles a Negro Boy named **Pompey**, a feather bed, furniture and choice cow & calf.

Son Obediah H. Trent 5 pounds.

Son John Henry Trent a Negro Boy named **Gabriel** which I desire be hired out till the said **John Henry Trent** shall be of age.

Grandson Alexander Trent a Negro Girl named Zada.

Grandson Henry Trent a Negro Girl named Roda.

Thomas Mitchell keep Zada and Roda for three years, then John B. Trent keep them for three years, then Thomas Mitchell keep them for two years, then my Executors hire them out till Alexander Trent comes of age, then deliver Zada to him; also when Henry Trent comes of age, deliver Roda to him.

Executors: son **Obediah Henry Trent**, Ambrose Rucker, Thomas Moore Witnesses: Joseph Magann, Micajah Goodwin, Archelaus Mitchell, Junr., Charles Carter.
