

1305. Documentation for Mary Morril
(Abt. 1620 to Abt. 1704)
mother of Eleazer Folger
(1648 to 19 December 1716)

Mary Morril was born about 1620 in Norwich, Norfolk County, England.(1) She died in 1704 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(2) Mary Morril married Peter Folger in 1644 at Martha's Vineyard, Massachusetts.(3) Peter Folger and Mary Morril were the maternal grandparents of Benjamin Franklin.(4)

Peter Folger was born 1618 in Norwich, Norfolk, England.(5) He died in 1690 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(6) Peter Folger was the son of John Folger and Meribah Gibbs.(7)

Mary Morril is mentioned in *Moby Dick*, by Herman Melville. "True enough, but then whalemenselves are poor devils; they have no good blood in their veins. *No go blood in their veins?* They have something better than royal blood there. The grandmother of Benjamin Franklin was Mary Morrel; afterwards, by marriage, Mary Folger, one of the old settlers of Nantucket, and the ancestress to a long line of Folders and harpooners—all kith and kin to noble Benjamin—this day darting the barbed iron from one side of the world to the other."(8)

On a map in the collection of the Nantucket Historical Association, **Peter Folger** lived just west of **William Worth**.(9) Their land was separated by Crooked Land. West Chester St. bordered the north side of William Worth's land and ran west through the land of Peter Folger.

Children of Peter Folger and Mary Morril:

i. **Bethia Folger** probably was born about 1644 in Martha's Vineyard, Dukes, Massachusetts.(10) She died 06 June 1669 in a boating accident with her husband and brother Eleazer Folger.(11) She married **John Barnard** 26 February 1666/67 in Nantucket.(12) He was born 02 January 1641/42 in Salisbury, Massachusetts.(13)

ii. **Dorcas Folger** probably was born about 1645.(14) She died in ????.(15) She married **Joseph Pratt** in 1675.(16) He was born about 1645.(17) Joseph Pratt died 24 December 1712 in Charleston, Massachusetts.(18)

iii. **Joanna Folger** was born in 1645 in Martha's Vineyard, Dukes, Massachusetts.(19) She died 18 July 1719 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(20) She married **John Coleman** about 1666.(21) He was born about 1644.(22) He died 07 December 1715.(23)

iv. **Eleazer Folger** was born in 1648 in Edgartown, Dukes, Massachusetts.(24) He died 19 December 1716 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(25) married **Sarah Gardner** about 1671 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(26)

v. **Bethsheba Folger** was born in 1650 at Martha's Vineyard, Dukes, Massachusetts.(27) She died in 1726.(28) She married **John or Joseph Pope** 1676 in Salem Village, Essex, Massachusetts.(29)

vi. **Patience Folger** was born in 1652 in Martha's Vineyard, Dukes, Massachusetts.(30) She died in January 1716/17 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(31) She married first **Hephzibah Harker**.(32) She married second **Jas Gardner**.(33)

vii. **John Folger** was born in 1659 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(34) He died 23 August 1732 in Nantucket.(35) He married **Mary Barnard** 1688 in Nantucket.(36) She was born 24 February 1666/67 in Nantucket.(37) She died 06 October 1737.(38)

viii. **Abiah Folger** was born 15 August 1667 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(39) She died 18 May 1752 in Boston, Massachusetts.(40) She married **Josiah E. Franklin** 25 November 1689 in Old South Church, Boston, Massachusetts.(41) He was born 23 December 1657 in Ecton, Northamptonshire, England.(42) He died about 1744 in Boston, Suffolk, Massachusetts.(43) Josiah and Abiah (Folger) Franklin were the parents of **Benjamin Franklin**.(44)

ix. **Experience Folger** was born in 1668 in Martha's Vineyard, Dukes, Massachusetts.(45) She died 04 June 1739.(46) She married John Swain about 1687.(47) He was born 01 September 1664 in Nantucket, Massachusetts.(48) He died before 02 March 1738/39.(49)

Quoted from William Coleman Folger, *The Folger Family*, New England Historic Genealogical Society, NEHGS Register 1862, page 269:

John Folger and his son Peter (the name was then frequently written Foulger), are said to have crossed the Atlantic in the same ship with Hugh Peters, in the year 1635. They came from Norwich, in the county of Norfolk, England. Peter was then about 18 years of age. At what time they settled at Watertown, Mass., is not known, but in 1642 John Folger was possessed of a homestead in that town, and owned six acres of land. It is probable that John and Peter Folger accompanied Thomas Mayhew, Jr., to Martha's Vineyard in 1641 or 1642. John Owned a house, upland, commonage and meadow land at the Vineyard, as appears by the Vineyard records. John Folger died about 1660. **Meribell Folger** his widow, was living in 1664. Her surname is said to have been **Gibbs**. According to tradition, John was a widower when he came over; if this be correct, he must have married her after his arrival in America.

Peter Folger, son of John, born in England, accompanied his father to America in 1635, and probably emigrated with him to the Vineyard in 1642. He married in 1644, **Mary Morrill**, who had been an inmate in the family of **Hugh Peters**, and according to tradition a fellow passenger with him from England. Whilst at the Vineyard he taught school and also practiced as a surveyor of land. He also assisted the younger Thomas Mayhew in his work of Christianizing the native Indians. Rev. Experience Mayhew, in a letter to John Gardner, Esq., dated 1694, state that when Thomas Mayhew, Jr., left for England in 1657, he left the care of his church or mission with Peter Folger. Peter became a Baptist in his sentiments, and after his removal to Nantucket is said to have baptized two persons in Waipitequage pond.

At a meeting of the proprietors of the island of Nantucket, held in Salisbury in the latter part of 1660 or early part of 1661, five persons were chosen to measure and lay out the land, and in the order it is said, that what shall be done by them, or any three of them, Peter Folger being one, shall be accounted

legal and valid. This vote shows the confidence they placed in his judgment and integrity.

Whilst a resident at the Vineyard he acquired the Indian language, which was of great service to him in business affairs and in enabling him to communicate religious instruction to the natives.

In the summer of 1659, he is said to have accompanied as an interpreter, Tristram Coffin and others who visited the island of Nantucket to view it about the time of the purchase from Mayhew. He was there in 1661 and 1662, surveying, and on the 4th of July, 1663, the proprietors of Nantucket granted him half a share of land on Nantucket, or half as much as one of the twenty purchasers, provided he would come to inhabit with his family on the aforesaid island within one year after the date, and attend the English in the way of an interpreter between the Indians and them upon all necessary occasions. He accepted the grant and moved there with his family within the specified time.

On the 21st of July, 1673, he was chosen clerk of the courts, which office he held some years. In his poem—"A Looking Glass for the Times," published April 23, 1676, he shows himself an advocate for religious liberty, and strongly condemns the persecuting spirit exhibited in New England in his day. Dr. Benjamin Franklin, his grandson, when in England, found no arms for the Folgers at the Herald's office, and concluded that they were a Flemish family who came over in the time of Queen Elizabeth. There were others of the name in England besides John Folger and son, as in the latter part of last century a young man named Thomas Folger, Jr., son of Thomas and Mary (Rant) Folger of Norfolk, England, came over and married Abigail, dau. Of Daniel Folger, at Easton, N.Y. This Thomas Folger moved to Charlton, Saratoga county, N.Y., where he died May 22, 1838, aged 80 years.

Peter Folger 1st, d. in 1690, and Mary his widow survived him, dying in the year 1704. The ch. of Peter and Mary Folger were as follows: (3) Joanna, m. John Coleman, son of Thomas. (4) Bethiah, m. Feb. 26, 1668, John Barnard, son of Robert. They were drowned between Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard, by the upsetting of a boat, June 6, 1669. (5) Dorcas, m. Feb. 12, 1675, Joseph Pratt of Charlestown. (6) Eleazer, b. 1648; m. Sarah Gardner, dau. Of Richard and Sarah. (7) Bathshua, m. Joseph Pope, son of Joseph of Salem. (8) Patience, m. 1st. ____ Harker; m. 2d, James Gardner, son of Richard. (9) John, b. 1659; m. Mary Barnard, dau. Of Nathaniel. (10) Experience, m. John Swain, Jr., son of John. (11) Abiah, b. 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FOLGER, Peter, colonist, born in England in 1617; died in Nantucket, Massachusetts, in 1690. He left Norwich, England, in 1635, with his father, settled in Watertown, Massachusetts, and removed to Martha's Vineyard in 1641, where he taught, surveyed land, and assisted Thomas Mayhew, the missionary, in his labors among the Indians. He afterward became a Baptist minister, and in 1663 he removed to Nantucket, having been offered by the proprietors a half share of land if he would serve there as surveyor and interpreter. He was one of five commissioners to lay out land; it was voted that, "whatever shall be done by them, or any three of them, Peter Folger being one, shall be accounted legal and valid." He was also a clerk of the courts for a time. Cotton Mather, in his "Ecclesiastical History of the Province in New England," refers to Folder as pious

and learned.

He was familiar with the scriptures, taught them to the youths, and occasionally preached. Among other lesser pieces, he published a poem entitled "A Looking Glass for the Times; or, The Former Spirit of New England revived in this Generation" (1675; 2d ed., 1763). Of it Benjamin Franklin, in his autobiography, says: "The poem, in familiar verse, appeared to be written with a manly freedom and a pleasing simplicity, agreeably to the tastes of the times and the country. The author addresses himself to the governors of the colonies, speaks for liberty of conscience, and in favor of the toleration of sects, among them the Quakers and Anabaptists, who had suffered persecution.

"His daughter, **Abiah**, born in Nantucket, 15 August 1667, married **Josiah Franklin**, and became the mother of **Benjamin Franklin**.

His great-grandson, Peleg, sailor, born in Nantucket, Massachusetts, 13 October 1733; died there, 26 May 1789. His life was passed on a farm until he was twenty-one years old, when he changed from land to sea, and for several years was engaged in the cod and whale fisheries. He kept a journal of his voyages, which is written in a much more scholarly manner than could be expected from his limited education. Some of the verses that he introduced into his journal were quoted in Macy's "History of Nantucket," and seem to be those of a scholar rather than a sailor. On his retirement from the sea, his counsel was much sought by his neighbors. He was a member of the Society of Friends.

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Englishman,' if I remember the words rightly. I have heard that he wrote sundry small occasional pieces, but only one of them was printed, which I saw now many years since. It was written in 1675, in the home-spun verse of that time and people, and addressed to those then concerned in the government there. It was in favor of liberty of conscience, and in behalf of the Baptists, Quakers, and other sectaries that had been under persecution, ascribing the Indian wars, and other distresses that had befallen the country, to that persecution, as so many judgments of God to punish so heinous an offense, and exhorting a repeal of those uncharitable laws. The whole appeared to me as written with a good deal of decent plainness and manly freedom. The six concluding lines I remember, though I have forgotten the two first of the stanza; but the purport of them was, that his censures proceeded from good-will, and, therefore, he would be known to be the author. "Because to be a libeler (says he) I hate it with my heart; From Sherburne town, where now I dwell My name I do put here; Without offense your real friend, It is Peter Folgier."

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PILGRIM CONTEMPORARIES

The Nantucket Connection – Peter Folger

by his great-great-great-great-great-great-great-grandson

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The success of the Pilgrim adventure and life in Plymouth Colony had a significant effect on life in New England. As the years advanced from 1620, the events outside of Plymouth Colony had a significant effect on those within Plymouth Colony. Let's take a look at the life and times of a contemporary settler outside of Plymouth Colony and how the times affected him. One such individual was Peter Folger, a remarkable man who was part businessman, part missionary, part educator, part politician, part diplomat and a friend to many. He raised nine children, the youngest of whom "Abiah" was the mother of Benjamin Franklin who some have said resembled his grandfather not only physically but in ability as well. (see *Mayflower Quarterly*, March 2006 Vol. 72 No. 1 pages 35-37.) The eldest son was "Eleazer" from whom I am descended. Many of the members of the Mayflower Society are pleased to be a descendant of Peter Folger. This article is especially for them.

Tradition places Peter Folger and his father John, as passengers on the ship *Abigail* that landed at Boston on 6 Oct 1635.^[1] I have found no documentation to prove when they arrived, other than that stated in genealogies and history books. The tradition is possibly correct since there is documentation that the Rev. Hugh Peter was a passenger on the *Abigail*,^[2] and he had an indentured servant named Mary Morrill who became the wife of Peter Folger. Some believe that they met on board the ship. We do know that Peter's father, John Folger, was proposed for a proprietor in the Massachusetts Bay Colony at Dedham in 1638^[3] and that he owned a home in that same colony at Watertown in 1642.^[4]

Peter Foulger was born in Norwich, Norfolk, England about 1617. He was the son of John Foulgier (1593–1660) and Merible Gibbs (1596–1664).^[5] John Foulgier's parents were said to have been Flemish immigrants that left Flanders during the reign of Queen Elizabeth I to escape persecution as Protestants.^[6] The spelling of the name has changed from Foulgier used by the father John and Foulger used by his son Peter (he signed his name peter ffoulger). The children of Peter Foulger created the spelling Folger which they all used, and it is the spelling used by all of their descendants.

Exactly when John and Peter first became associated with Thomas Mayhew is uncertain. However, they resided in Watertown when Thomas Mayhew resided there, and they removed to Martha's Vineyard soon after Thomas Mayhew began a settlement in 1642. Thomas Mayhew and his son Thomas purchased the islands of Nantucket, Muskeget and Tuckernuck on 13 Oct 1641 and the island of

Martha's Vineyard, and the Elizabeth Islands on 23 Oct 1641 from the agent of William Alexander, Earl of Sterling, and the island of Martha's Vineyard on 25 Oct 1641 from the agent of Sir Ferdinando Gorges who also claimed proprietary rights.^[7] The islands were first a part of the Colony of New York and later a Colony unto themselves with Thomas Mayhew as Governor 7 July 1671.^[8] In 1692, during the reign of King William and Queen Mary, Parliament reorganized the Royal Colonies and united the Colony of Plymouth and Massachusetts Bay into the Colony of Massachusetts. After some arguments, the islands of Thomas Mayhew were included in the new Colony of Massachusetts.^[9] Therefore the island residents could have lived in three different colonies without ever moving – talk about confusing.

The first documented evidence that John Foulgier lived on Martha's Vineyard was 1 Sep 1652 when he was chosen hog reeve.^[10] He drew a lot in the Planting Field division on 8 May 1653 and 21 Apr 1660 at Crackatuxett, but on 22 Oct 1660 the share is referred to as belonging to the heirs of John Foulgier. He died sometime between the two dates and left only a verbal will.^[11]

Peter Folger was described by Cotton Mather as “a pious and learned Englishman,” which is not surprising when you consider that he is a qualifying ancestor for the Colonial Clergy.^[12] It is said that he removed to Martha's Vineyard in the employ of Thomas Mayhew, Sr. The first record of his being there is 14 Oct 1647 when he signed as a witness to a document. But, he probably was there much earlier. One of the espoused projects of Thomas Mayhew, Sr. was the conversion of the indigenous Wampanoag on his Islands to Christianity. In this he had a secret weapon, his son Thomas, who had come with him to New England when about 10 or 12 years of age. He was a studious young man who became interested in working as a missionary. He learned the Wampanoag language and probably preceded his father in residence on Martha's Vineyard. One of his friends from Watertown was Peter Folger who also had an affinity for learning. The Rev. Thomas Prince in his published work *New England Chronology* (1736) stated “an able godly Englishman, named Peter Foulger, employed in teaching the youth in Reading, Writing, and the Principles of Religion by Catechizing, being well learned likewise in Scripture, and capable of helping them in religious matters.”^[13]

Peter Folger was elected an assistant to Governor Mayhew in 1654 and 1655 and about that same time appears on the records of the Society for Propagating the Gospel as receiving an annual sum for being a schoolmaster. At that time he was also an aide to Rev. Thomas Mayhew, Jr. in missionary work with the Wampanoag, and he was approved by the Commissioners of the United Colonies to teach the Indian youths the English language. Peter had a good rapport with his students and their families. He became the principal missionary when Rev. Thomas Mayhew was lost at sea in 1657 while traveling to England. Folger was well respected by Governor Mayhew who wrote in 1659 to John Winthrop, Jr. “If

I should be taken by death, here is help that the schoolmaster (Peter Folger) who hath some language," etc.^[14] However, nothing remains the same and over time Peter's religious views were changing. The Puritan religious society that employed him did not appreciate his embracing the views of the group now known as Baptists. In 1661 they stopped supporting him, and it became difficult enough on the island that in 1662 he removed with his family to a more tolerant settlement in Newport, and then in Portsmouth, Rhode Island. In 1663 he was invited to settle on Nantucket.

Peter Folgers's relationship with the Wampanoag, his character and abilities, impressed the original purchasers of the Island of Nantucket. Peter had gone in 1659 with the first purchasers to explore the island, and he introduced them to the indigenous Wampanoag residents who greeted them as friends, since they were with Peter. When the agreement of purchase from Thomas Mayhew Sr. and the Wampanoag had been reached, it was with the understanding that Peter would assist in the laying out of the house lots on that island and mark the boundaries between the land of the English and the land of the Wampanoag. In fact when a committee of five was established to "Measure and lay out said land whatsoever shall be done and concluded by any three of them, Peter Folger being one, shall be accounted Legal and valid"^[15] – was an impressive comment on his honesty and their respect for his judgment.

Each of the ten original proprietors of Nantucket Island took an equal partner soon after the purchase agreement was signed in July 1659. These twenty men are known as the *First Purchasers* (Thomas Barnard* & Robert Barnard* – Peter Coffin* & James Coffin* – Tristram Coffin Sr.* & Nathaniel Starbuck – Stephen Greenleaf & Tristram Coffin Jr. – Christopher Hussey* & Robert Pike – Thomas Macy* & Edward Starbuck* – Thomas Mayhew* & John Smith – William Pile sold his share to John Bishop & William Bunker* – John Swain* & Thomas Coleman – Richard Swain* & Thomas Look) and had an equal share in the land on the Island.^[16] (*I am descended from each of these eleven *First Purchasers*.)

On 15 July 1661 at a meeting of the owners on Nantucket, with Peter Folger present, they agreed to the area and size of the house lots that each person entitled to a **full share** would receive. Each of the *First Purchasers* chose a lot of 20 or more acres, the location of which was duly noted by Peter Folger.^[17] Not all of the *First Purchasers* chose to live on the Island. However, they all recognized that to have a viable community they needed to entice other settlers to join them and in particular those who had special skills that would be needed in the community and were not possessed by the current residents. Technically Nantucket was part of the Colony of New York; however, the government of New York paid little attention to what was happening on Nantucket. The residents settled their own affairs as freeholders of the island. As long as they got along with each other there was no need to involve the government in New York. Each freeholder had a right to participate in discussions and vote on issues concerning the

inhabitants of the island and had certain rights to the use of the public lands. Therefore, the offer of free land and the rights of a freeholder was a good enticement to attract individuals and families to reside on Nantucket. As time progressed, a number of individuals were offered a half share on the island if they brought their families and lived and worked there for a certain period of time. It wasn't surprising that Peter Folger was offered such a "half share."

The residence of Peter Folger and his family on Nantucket is noted in the records of the freeholders dated 1 March 1664-5, "Peter Folger is accepted as a Tradesman namely as a Surveyor, Interpreter and Millar by his son a Shoemaker his House Lot is laid out by Tristram Coffin and Thomas Macy at a place commonly called and known by Rogers Field, Laying on the North side of the Swamp that leads from Wesco to Waquittaquage and Measuring forty five rod one way and forty the other way, himself also being present – more or less as tis Laid out."^[18] The son that is mentioned is Eleazer. In 1670 he received his own half share as noted in the records of the freeholders. "On the 24th of the 6th mo. 1670, the grant made to Eleazer Folger, of half of a share of accommodation, on condition that he learn the trade of a smith and follow that occupation on the island, was confirmed to him, he having fulfilled the conditions."^[19]

As the population of the islands of Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket continued to grow, so did the commercial interests in the islands and the travel between there and the main land of Plymouth Colony. In the records of Plymouth Colony of 7 Feb 1664-5 is the following: "Mr. Isaac Robinson was approved and allowed by the Court to keep an ordinary at Saconesset (Falmouth) for the entertainment of strangers, – in regard that it doth appear that there is a great recourse to and fro by travelers to Martha's Vineyard, Nantucket, etc."^[20]

Nantucket was a good place to raise sheep and cattle, but its principal industry was fishing. Whales could be hunted close to shore. Trade was important but it could be dangerous. French pirates roamed the waters all around the islands. They usually stayed at sea but were known to land on occasion and raid an isolated farm house. The islands were shared with the Indian population. As long as the native people were treated fairly and with respect, there was little cause for fear. But, it was always a possibility that there could be trouble of some sort. Peter Folger was instrumental in keeping good relations with the native Wampanoag. He was known to be honest and fair and a believer in democracy. These attributes while admirable brought about more than one clash of political differences among the settlers such as the great insurrection of 1673.


In July of 1673 the Dutch attacked and defeated the English in New York, thus taking control of the colony that had previously been taken from them by the English. This severed the ties between Nantucket and Governor Lovelace of New York. Also, at this time a number of disputes came to a head and the half share men found themselves in the majority on the island. The *First Purchasers* considered themselves in control of Nantucket and as full share men their vote

should be counted twice when compared to the vote of the half share men. Naturally the half share men thought that each man should have an equal vote. Much arguing took place and in the attempt to take control of island affairs the residents became divided into two groups. The English defeated the Dutch a few months later and Edward Andros became Governor of New York. The power struggle continued for some time and confusion existed as to who was in authority on the island. In 1677 Peter Folger landed in jail for not paying a fine that was imposed on him for his refusal to produce the Clerk's Record Book. He was the Clerk and responsible for the safe keeping of the records and stated in a petition to the Governor of New York that he was being asked to write into the official records, actions that he had no knowledge of and that had occurred during meetings he was not informed of and that if he did not do what he was told to do that Peter Coffin stated "they would presently choose a new Clerk." He further stated that when Chief Magistrate Thomas Macy sent a constable to him to seize all of the records in his possession, he responded in writing "that the Booke was put into my Hands by the Generall Court, and til the same Power, or a higher, did cal for it from me I should Indeavour to keepe it, but if they would have any Coppys out of it they might at any Time have them."^[21] Peter Folger remained true to his principals and remained in jail for some time. He was not totally freed until the end of 1680 when the heated arguments had cooled and the antagonists had melted. The Record Book in question was never found.

Peter Folger's stature with the English residents on the island had diminished. But, he was still respected by them and he was highly regarded among the Indian population. However, all was not well on the mainland. The Massasoit Osamequen, great leader of the Wampanoag, had died in 1660 and the long peace with the residents of Plymouth Colony began to unravel. The continued growth of the English population and their inevitable need for more land had resulted in many disputes and lack of respect for each other. The cordial coexistence among the "first comers" to Plymouth no longer existed. The new leader of the Wampanoag, Metacom the son of the great Massasoit Osamequen, now known to the English as King Philip, found himself cornered in an undesirable situation. As a result of selling land to the growing English population, Philip Metacom found himself surrounded by land belonging to the English and choking the rights of his people to hunt and fish freely.^[22] He was faced with a difficult choice: give in to the English encroachment and lack of respect or destroy them by driving them out of the Wampanoag ancestral lands. He chose to fight and to kill those who would not leave. In preparation for war he traveled to the various settlements of his own nation and to other Indian nations to solicit their compliance in this war against the English. He traveled to Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket to visit the Wampanoag there and to encourage them to rise up and kill the English living on those Islands. They respectfully refused due in great part to their association with Peter Folger. The relationship that Peter Folger and others

on the islands maintained with the local Indians and their fair treatment with each other now paid off big time. The Wampanoag on Martha's Vineyard and Nantucket would have no part in King Philip's War.

A respect for each person's right to his own religious beliefs and the right to live peacefully among each other, combined with a strong understanding of what he determined was right and wrong, coupled with a desire to defend his position, prompted Peter Folger to write about the problems of his day and the consequences that wrong actions could bring forth. His grandson, Benjamin Franklin, stated in his autobiography, "I have heard that he wrote sundry small occasional Pieces, but only one of them was printed which I saw now many Years since. It was written in 1676, in the homespun Verse of that Time and People, and address'd to those then concern'd in the Government there. It was in favour of Liberty of Conscience, and in behalf of the Baptists, Quakers, and other Sectaries, that had been under Persecution; ascribing the Indian Wars and other Distresses, that had befallen the Country to that Persecution, as so many Judgments of God, to punish so heinous an Offence; and exhorting a Repeal of those uncharitable Laws. The Whole appear'd to me as written with a good deal of Decent Plainness and manly Freedom."^[23] I have seen quoted in various histories of those times only parts of the poem referred to by Benjamin Franklin. Perhaps that is because of its length or perhaps it is the lack of polish that may be expected in a well written poem. However, Florence Bennett Anderson included all 107 stanzas in her book *A Grandfather for Benjamin Franklin* published in 1940. She had access to the original autographed manuscript written in 1676 as well as original printed copies now in the archives of the Nantucket Historical Association. It is included here for your enjoyment and insight into the times of the Pilgrims. The rhyme of the poem reflects the dialect or accent of the spoken language at the time it was written. I have modernized the spelling for easier reading but have not changed the words. The poem was first printed by John Foster at the "Sign of the Dove" in Boston in 1676^[24] under the title *A Looking Glasse For the Times, or the Former Spirit of New England Revived in This Generation*.

The preceding genealogy is the most accurate that I have been able to find. In this time period even vital records can have errors and omissions. Some sources have been confused by the same name in different generations. Some sources give dates as day, month, year, which can be confusing when you consider that various calendars existed and began the year on a different date. (The calendar that the Pilgrims used started the year on March 25). The desire to standardize the calendar in the middle of the 1700s also adjusted it by 10 or 11 days. (The Pilgrims considered that they signed the Compact on Nov 11, 1620 but that date on today's calendar is Nov 21, 1620). Not all groups accepted the new calendar at the same time. Therefore this genealogy comes from a variety of sources; most confirm the other source but some state a different statistic. I have stated the most likely statistic (in my opinion). The signer of the Declaration of Independence and founding father of the United States: **Benjamin Franklin**³ (*Abiah*² Folger, *Peter*¹)

The last Royal Governor of the Colony of New Jersey who remained steadfastly loyal to his king, became estranged from his father and son, was exiled to England and died in London: **William Franklin**⁴ (*Benjamin Franklin*³, *Abiah*² Folger, *Peter*¹)

The personal secretary of his grandfather (Benjamin Franklin), the diplomatic representative of the Continental Congress in France from 1776 to 1785, who maintained his grandfather's records and edited his writings: **William Temple Franklin**⁵ (*William*⁴ Franklin, *Benjamin*³, *Abiah*² Folger, *Peter*¹)

The whaling captain who charted the Atlantic Gulf Stream for his cousin Benjamin Franklin: **Capt. Timothy Folger**⁵ (*Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The whaling captain who discovered the "lost" mutineers of the ship *HMS Bounty* and correctly located the Pacific Island of Pitcairn and recorded it in the log of his ship *Topaz*: **Capt. Mayhew Folger**⁶ (*William*⁵, *Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The graduate of the US Naval Academy during the Civil War who distinguished himself as an officer, lighthouse inspector, and ship, squadron, and China fleet commander in the Pacific: **Rear Admiral William Mayhew Folger**⁸ (*Robert*⁷, *Mayhew*⁶, *William*⁵, *Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The woman who in 1829 refrained from the use of food and material produced by slave labor and became an active Anti-Slavery advocate and promoter of Women's Rights, and a world renowned speaker: **Lucretia (Coffin) Mott**⁷ (*Anna*⁶ *Folger*, *William*⁵, *Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The celebrated astronomer who in 1861 was made Professor of Astronomy and Director of the Observatory at Vassar College, after being acknowledged through out the world as the first discoverer of a telescopic comet: **Maria Mitchell**⁷ (*Lydia Coleman*⁶, *Lydia*⁵ *Folger*, *Jonathan*⁴, *Jonathan*³, *John*², *Peter*¹)

The young man who went to San Francisco during the California Gold Rush and made his fortune selling coffee to the miners and then established the Folger Coffee Company: **James Athearn Folger**⁸ (*Samuel*⁷, *George*⁶, *George*⁵, *Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The one time President of Standard Oil Company of New York and collector of original writings of William Shakespeare who founded the Folger Shakespeare Library in Washington D.C.: **Henry Clay Folger**⁹ (*Henry*⁸, *Samuel*⁷, *George*⁶, *George*⁵, *Abishai*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹)

The founder and first Historian of the California Society who developed with George Bowman the concept of the Five Generations Project: **Herbert Folger**⁸⁻⁹ (*Seth*⁷, *William*⁶ [*husband of Lucy*⁷], *Charles*⁵, *Frederick*⁴, *Eleazer*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹) and (*Seth*⁸, *Lucy*⁷ [*wife of William*⁶], *Thaddeus*⁶, *Owen*⁵, *Peter*⁴, *Nathan*³, *Eleazer*², *Peter*¹) and (*Seth*⁷, *William*⁶, *Lydia*⁵ *Coleman*, *Enoch*⁴, *Jeremiah*³, *Joanna*² *Folger*, *Peter*¹) and (*Seth*⁷, *William*⁶, *Lydia*⁵ *Coleman*, *Enoch*⁴, *Sarah Pratt*³, *Dorcas*² *Folger*, *Peter*¹)

THE FOLGER FAMILY.

[Compiled by WILLIAM COLEMAN FOLGER of Nantucket, a Corresponding Member of the N. E. Historic-Genealogical Society.]

1. JOHN FOLGER and his son Peter (the name was then frequently written Foulger), are said to have crossed the Atlantic in the same ship with Hugh Peters, in the year 1635. They came from Norwich, in the county of Norfolk, England. Peter was then about 18 years of age. At what time they settled at Watertown, Mass., is not known, but in 1642 John Folger was possessed of a homestead in that town, and owned six acres of land. It is probable that John and Peter Folger accompanied Thomas Mayhew, Jr., to Martha's Vineyard in 1641 or 1642. John owned a house, upland, commonage and meadow land at the Vineyard, as appears by the Vineyard records. John Folger died about 1660. Meribell Folger his widow, was living in 1664. Her surname is said to have been Gibbs. According to tradition, John was a widower when he came over; if this be correct, he must have married her after his arrival in America.

2. PETER FOLGER, son of John, born in England, accompanied his father to America in 1635, and probably emigrated with him to the Vineyard in 1642. He married in 1644, Mary Morrill, who had been an inmate in the family of Hugh Peters, and according to tradition, a fellow passenger with him from England. Whilst at the Vineyard he taught school and also practiced as a surveyor of land. He also assisted the younger Thomas Mayhew in his work of Christianizing the native Indians. Rev. Experience Mayhew, in a letter to John Gardner, Esq., dated 1694, stated that when Thomas Mayhew, Jr., left for England in 1657, he left the care of his church or mission with Peter Folger. Peter became a Baptist in his sentiments, and after his removal to Nantucket is said to have baptized two persons in Waipitequage pond.

At a meeting of the proprietors of the island of Nantucket, held in Salisbury in the latter part of 1660 or early part of 1661, five persons were chosen to measure and lay out the land, and in the order it is said, that what shall be done by them, or any three of them, Peter Folger being one, shall be accounted legal and valid. This vote shows the confidence they placed in his judgment and integrity.

Whilst a resident at the Vineyard he acquired the Indian language, which was of great service to him in business affairs and in enabling him to communicate religious instruction to the natives.

In the summer of 1659, he is said to have accompanied as an interpreter, Tristram Coffin and others who visited the island of Nantucket to view it about the time of the purchase from Mayhew. He was there in 1661 and 1662, surveying, and on the 4th of July, 1663, the proprietors of Nantucket granted him half a share of land on Nantucket, or half as much as one of the twenty purchasers, provided he would come to inhabit with his family on the aforesaid island within one year after that date, and attend the English in the way of an interpreter between the Indians and them upon all neces-

sary occasions. He accepted the grant and moved there with his family within the specified time.

On the 21st of July, 1673, he was chosen clerk of the courts, which office he held some years. In his poem—"A Looking Glass for the Times," published April 23, 1676, he shows himself an advocate for religious liberty, and strongly condemns the persecuting spirit exhibited in New England in his day. Dr. Benjamin Franklin, his grandson, when in England, found no arms for the Folgers at the Herald's office, and concluded that they were a Flemish family who came over in the time of Queen Elizabeth. There were others of the name in England besides John Folger and son, as in the latter part of last century a young man named Thomas Folger, Jr., son of Thomas and Mary (Rant) Folger of Norfolk, England, came over and married Abigail,³ dau. of Daniel⁴ Folger, at Easton, N. Y. This Thomas Folger moved to Charlton, Saratoga county, N. Y., where he died May 22, 1838, aged 80 years.

Peter Folger 1st, d. in 1690, and Mary his widow survived him, dying in the year 1704. The ch. of Peter and Mary Folger were as follows: (3) *Joanna*,² [+] m. John Coleman, son of Thomas. Recorded for Mr Tristram Coffin and Mr Thomas Macy, y^e 29th of June, 1671
aforesaid.

These P^rsents Wittness, y^e I, Wanackmamack, Head Sachem of y^e Island of Nantuckett, have Bargained and Sold, and doe by these Presents Bargaine and Sell unto **Tristram Coffin, Thomas Macy**, Rich^d Swayne, Thomas Bernard, John Swayne, Mr. Thomas Mayhew, **Edward Starbuck**, Peter Coffin, James Coffin, Stephen Greenleafe, Tristram Coffin Jun^r, Thomas Coleman, Robert Bernard, Christopher Hufsey, Robert Pyke, John Smyth, and John Bishop, these Islands of Nantuckett, namely, all y^e West end of y^e afores^d Island unto y^e Pond comonly called Wa-quittaquay, and from y^e Head of that Pond to y^e North side of y^e Island Manamoy ; Bounded by a Path from y^e Head of y^e Pond aforesaid to Manamoy ; as also a Neck at y^e East End of y^e Island called Poquomock, wth the Property thereof, and all y^e Royaltyies, Priviledges, and Immunityes thereto belonging, or whatsoever Right I y^e afores^d Wanackmak have, or have had in y^e Same : That is, all y^e Lands aforementioned and likewise y^e Winter ffeed of y^e whole Island from y^e End of an Indyan Harvest untill Planting Time, or y^e first of May, from Yeare to Yeare for ever ; as likewise Liberty to make Use of Wood and Timber on all Parts of y^e Island ; and like wise Halfe of the Meadows and Marshes on all Parts of y^e Island, wthout or beside y^e afores^d Tracts of Land purchased ; And likewise y^e use of y^e other Halfe of y^e Meadows and Marshes, as long as y^e aforesaid English their Heyres or Assignes live on y^e Island ; And likewise I the aforesaid Wanackmamack doe sell unto y^e English aforementioned y^e propriety of y^e rest of y^e Island belonging unto mee, **for and in confideracon of ffourty Pounds** already received by mee or other by my Consent or Ord^r. To Have and to Hold, y^e afores^d Tracts of Land wth y^e P^rpriety, Royalties, Immunityes, Priveledges and all Appertenances thereunto belonging to them y^e afores^d Purchas^{rs} their Heyres and Assignes forever.
