Mrs. Smith, with her son and husband, moved to Redlands, Calif. three years ago in hopes of restoring her failing health. She gradually weakened, however, and two weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Townsend went to California to see her.

Mrs. Townsend had not been entirely well since she suffered a slight haralytic stroke two years ago and the intense heat at Redlands was too much for her, and she became ill, falling rapidly. She died Saturday evening, and her daughter Sunday evening. The bodies were brought to Vader, arriving Thursday night.

Mrs. Richard Townsend, whose maiden name was Anna Margaret Kleese, was born in Beedeshelm, Germany, January 12, 1855. Her parents moved to America when she was about 14 years of age and America has been her home ever since. She married Richard Townsend May 24, 1875, in New York. Five children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Townsend: Mingaret, Katie and Bertha, all owhom are deed, Mrs. Truman Foster of Redlands, Calif., and Max Townsend for this place. Mrs. Townsend had been a member of the Rebekallofige at Vader since its organization thirty years ago and many Rebekahmembers from surrounding towns were present to pay their last tribute of respect to a sister.

Mrs. Townsend is survived by her husband, Richard Townsend, one son, Max Townsend of Start, and one daughter, Mrs. Truman Foster of Redlands, Calif., and six grandchildren, besides many triends who feel that her death is a great loss to the community.
