Mrs. Douglas passed away December 29, 1987 at Johnson Health Center, Florida Presbyterian Homes. Lakeland, FL. Bornona claim staked in the Oklahoma territory by her father, a Presbyterian Minister, Mrs. Douglas moved to Candler, FL with her family in 1911 where her father, The Rev. G. V. Marion County Council President of the PTA, member of the Daughters of the American Revolution and the United Daughters of the Confederacy, served

Mrs. Douglas filled offices in every judicatory of the United Presbyterian Church and in the Presbyterian Woman's organizations. In 1946, she was appointed to the executive Board of the National Council of United Presbyterian Women and served for 4 years. In 1951, she was appointed to the Board of Foreign Missions serving 7 years. In 1957, she was part of an interdenominational group present at the first graduation exercises of International Christian University in Tokyo.
