The following Wills were proved in open Court  
and admitted to record viz.

In the name of God Amen! I Drury Gibbons of  
the County of Lincoln & State of North Carolina  
being sick in body, but sound in mind & mind  
of purpose; but calling to mind that it is appointed  
for all men once to die - do by these presents  
make this my last will & testament

First I recommend my soul to God, who gave  
it & my body to the earth to be buried in a  
Christian form by & at the direction of my  
Executor. And last to my worldly substance, I will  
bequeath as follows.

I will not bequeath unto my beloved wife her  
the living of the plantation, on which she, during her  
widowhood, her household furniture & her clothing  
and unto my son Miller, I will part of my  
plantation, Beginning at a black oak on the old  
line & running with it N. 65 E 148 poles to a black oak  
old corner of house with another old line S 95 E  
1.24 poles to a white oak, thence with another of  
the old lines S 30 W 163 poles to a hickory, thence  
with another old line S 65 E 112 poles to a  
black oak on old line, thence a division line  
S 50 E 134 poles to a position in an old field near  
the big road. thence nearly with the big road S.  
59 E. 9.6 poles to the beginning. I also will unto him  
my personal property not otherwise willed, unto my  
son Moses. I will bequeath the remainder of my lands  
not heretofore willed. The rest of my children not being  
married, have already got all my estate that I intend for  
them. I nominate & appoint Isaac Holland & Milton  
W. Griswold my executors. Testimony whereof I have  
set my hand & seal. This 26<sup>th</sup> day of October 1827
